Approval of Reports

Pastor Jared: Thank you to the congregation for the last year of ministry. It was nice to get beyond the pandemic, but still face challenges. Thank you for being here and being a part of our congregation. We voted last year to undertake a BIG project that's been on the wish list for decades. We finished it! How many other congregations can do that so quickly? We have it all paid for, a little to raise for the 10% benevolence. Wow! We completed 900,000 in maintenance and improvements. We are a DEBT FREE congregation. We look forward to the ministries ahead. We have a lot to celebrate. Thank you for allowing me to serve as your pastor.

Director of Faith Formation - posted in our booklet - no questions.

Interim Director of YF Ministry/Intern Pr. Director of Youth & Family Ministry Director of Music Ministry - posted in our booklet - No questions.

Property Manager - Chris L: Report includes properties committee's work as well. Looking at the past year, projects we completed- proud of all of those things! We got a lot accomplished. Looking at the next year and years, the HVAC system is aging quickly, we have had a lot of repairs this winter. There are some furnaces that may be ready to go, etc. We have line items in the budget for those things, but something that is on our radar. A priority for next year: getting the HDR wall taken care of. Bid was about \$30,000 last year, probably gone up over the last year. We don't want water problems down there! Covers old classrooms and HDR. That is the biggest priority, a need more than want. Another thing is the stained glass windows: they need to get vented out, so they don't bow or break. They are the biggest insurance item we have, but can't truly replace them or even repair them to the originals. Lastly - thank yous to: properties, sexton, cemetery, everyone who comes to help out when needed.

Presentation of 2023 Budget - Not much to point out, we decided to add a 35% subsidy for staff positions. Brought us to a good projected income/expense ending. Salary increases - we did 4% last year, this year 4.5% increase proposed.

New Business

External Audit/Finance - church is growing well, money associated with that growth - we have been discussing an external audit. It is a lot for a few people to handle. We don't want to put ourselves in a situation where we would be not handling money professionally. We want to protect all people who handle incoming/outgoing money. Council wants to implement procedures that safeguard everyone involved. We want to reach out and form a task force with people with related expertise and knowledge. Looking for individuals to STEER a team, not to complete this audit themselves. Pastor Jared: Lynette, Vince and I have discussed that with all of our streams of income, we want to make sure everything is handled properly. We want to make sure the proper procedures are in place so that no embezzlements could ever happen. Lynette does a TON of work with our big projects, and our large income/expenses, it would also look at how can we operate our treasurer position in the best way. Maybe it is external. This is what we need from this task force. Any volunteers or anyone interested? Let us know, or let us know your ideas. Talk to Pastor, Elise, Mike, Lynette. We will be looking at getting this going soon.

Future Ministry Opportunities - Pastor Jared - Lots has changed after the pandemic. Things in our community, things in how people interact. Crooks is growing FAST, with lots of homes, apartments very close to us. Baltic is growing in a similar way. How do we reach out to those who are new to our community? It is up to us to reach out and invite people. Needs in our community are also growing. Services for families - preschool, childcare? Task force to identify ministry opportunities for our church that may be new and different. Ways to reach out and be a leading congregation in this area. As we regather and emerge from COVID, it is exciting to reach out and invite in visitors. It would be great to find ways that we can support people who are moving out into our area and provide

ministries to them in new ways. Suggestion: Preschool? New ways to do this.. We need a group of people to think about the future and plan reaching out opportunities. We are a congregation that leads, so let's lead and reach out. We can impact our community by sharing Christ's love in new ways. Questions/Comments: New committee? Yes - a new task force just to look at opportunities that we can start at WN. Cheryl: numbers of people we would want on the task force? Pastor: Let's gather names and then go from there. 5-6 people are interested in helping out that were present at the annual meeting. Comment: Gary B: Been here 60 years - seen a lot over the years. We supported families over the Vietnam war and they have never forgotten us. Sioux Falls has a lot of immigration, we have a lot of opportunities to support others.

Director of Faith Formation Report Jessi Rakness

- Sunday school continued in January 2023 after a break for the holidays. Each month for the second half of the Sunday school year focuses on a different grade's milestone that they lead/present during 10:30 worship.
 - January: 1st grade leads the Lord's Prayer
 - February: 5th grade leads the Apostle's Creed
 - March: Kindergarten leads the Benediction
 - April: 2nd grade recites the Ten Commandments and 4th grade First Communion
 - May: High school Senior Recognition Sunday where students receive a quilt from the quilters. (THANK YOU quilters!)
 - June: 6th grade Confirmation camp at Okoboji
 - October: 3-year-old Prayer Pillows given at our first ONE worship service and potluck of the school year
 - October: Reformation Sunday is Confirmation Sunday at 10:30.
- I lead the children's messages at both worship services.
- I attended high school graduation parties in May.
- iFaith Summer Edition was a valuable this summer for 4th-6th grade students on Wednesdays in June and July. They did a service projects at church, in the community, and at Feeding South Dakota in the morning and then spent the afternoon at various fun locations in Sioux Falls public pools, Thunder Road, and Wild Water West. We had 10-15 students attend each week.
- Planned Vacation Bible School with the Board of Education. This year we changed the bible school age to preschool through 3rd grade students (4th-6th grade students had Summer iFaith on Wednesdays that they could attend). This is the fifth summer we have created our own lessons, crafts, snack, and game based on our own theme, "It's a Miracle!" I wrote the bible lessons about miracle stories from the bible. THANK YOU to Caitlin Brackey for renting the bouncy house for us again this year!
- I ordered water bottle stickers for the Blessing of the Backpacks during Worship in the Park.
- Planning GIFT Sundays GIFT stands for Growing In Faith Together. GIFT Sundays are for everyone of all ages in the congregation to come and learn together. On GIFT Sundays, instead of parents dropping off their student(s), they join them. There are not regular Sunday school classes on GIFT Sundays. Health Ministry also led a couple of GIFT Sundays.
- iFaith is an energetic ministry that I lead EVERY Wednesday after school until 5:00. It's great to get together after school every Wednesday for a bible lesson, snack, games, and memorizing an important bible verse. We have about 12 students who consistently attend.
- Sunday school started in September. We're continuing to use the Whirl Lectionary curriculum, which I ordered in August. We begin in the sanctuary each Sunday at 9:35 with songs, a video, and lesson introduction. There are 2 or more co-teachers for each grade with 7th and 8th grade student helpers. THANK YOU to all of our amazing Sunday school teachers! Our milestones this fall were:
 - September: 3rd grade students receive their Adventure Bible (THANK YOU to WELCA for purchasing the bibles)
 - October: 9th grade Celebration of Passage and Confirmation (THANK YOU to Elise for set up and music and to Kristi for music)
- New this year I went back to leading High School Ministry on Wednesday nights. It's been a learning curve for me as I haven't led high school students in several years. It's been fun getting to know these students again as young adults instead of children. I'm very thankful for all Elise does on the administration side of high school ministry.
- Trunk or Treat was an outdoor event in the new Tri Valley Elementary school parking lot in conjunction with the Crooks Day Care fall fundraiser. THANK YOU to the cars who handed out candy and to Jason Carls for bringing the fire truck again this year!

- The Christmas program and hot cocoa bar were on December 10th! The students did a great job! We also had a student band again this year. THANK YOU to Kristi for picking out the music and for leading them. THANK YOU to the Board of Education for their work with the hot cocoa bar and the program!
- THANK YOU to Jennie Criddle for leading our Sunday school classroom renovations this summer! Bruce painted the downstairs rooms and hallway to match the Health Ministry room. New tables, colorful chairs, colorful drawers, and new dry erase boards were added to the rooms. THANK YOU to Chris Langloss and the Properties Team for moving furniture in and out!
- Write information for monthly The Reporter.
- Write a monthly council report.
- Communicate with parents and students on Facebook, through emails, phone calls, and texting. Send weekly
 emails to Sunday school teachers with information about the upcoming Sunday, supplies needed, and other
 events.
- Communicate Pastor Jared, Elise, and other people in leadership.
- Pastoral care of students and families.
- Give visiting families "The Jesus Storybook Bible"
- Write letters of recommendation for scholarships and jobs.

Thanks be to our faithful God for another year of gathering for worship and community at West Nidaros. We are so blessed that we continue to see consistent attendance and experience growth in our church community. This past year, we started the "One Worship" Sundays and had success in bringing our church family into a single worship time with fellowship following with the goal of building community and relationships within our congregation.

Worship is not something that just happens without the involvement and dedication of many individuals, both during the worship service as well as the preparations in advance of each worship service. It happens because of the endless work and dedication of many people; both by the West Nidaros staff as well as the many volunteers in our church community.

One of the main components of our worship is the music, and our congregation is so blessed to have our organists, Marge Hegge, Jill Rye, Barb Boone-Graves and Lavonne Burns offer their talents as graciously as they do. I also want to offer my gratitude to the members of our contemporary worship team for sharing their musical gifts and their leadership. We are blessed by the talents and dedication of all these servant musicians! Because of these musicians, we are able to provide a variety of worship styles with the use of our ELW liturgy, contemporary and blended style of worship. The frequency of these worship styles for 2023 is as follows: Traditional (ELW liturgy): 45 worship services; 9 Contemporary worship services; 4 Blended worship services ("Texas Kyrie" liturgy); 2 "Now the Feast and Celebration" liturgy.

My role and responsibilities as Director of Worship and Music for the past year have included:

- Collaboration with Pr. Jared and other staff to plan worship schedule
- Selecting hymns for traditional worship services
- Music selection and preparation for blended/contemporary worship
- Scheduling of organists
- Providing and assisting with worship accompaniment
- Arranging for special music and providing accompaniment for special music when needed
- Leading and accompanying the Adult Choir
- Recruiting and leading musicians for Easter worship services
- Email communication to all musicians of West Nidaros, providing hymn and song lists for upcoming worship services as well as general information for all who are involved in the music ministry
- Prepare monthly report for review by the church council
- Submit newsletter announcements

It takes the commitment of many to make worship happen, and worship is an integral piece to continue our mission of "Sharing Christ's Love with All". I am so very blessed to be a part of this ministry!

West Nidaros had another busy year with many projects and a few future projects that have been approved to include the waterproofing of the west wall of the basement and HDR kitchen. I would like to thank all of the folks on the properties committee for always being available when I have work to do that would be tough to accomplish by myself! Here is a list of the projects completed in 2023 (this list is not all inclusive).

- Installed lighting in the sanctuary and the main entrance area
- Installed the glass railing in the balcony
- Roof inspection was accomplished
- Painting completed in the classroom hallway in the basement
- Installed new tables, chairs, and white boards in all classrooms
- Bunn coffee maker was cleaned and serviced (FLC)
- Door inspection accomplished on our glass double doors (awaiting service and adjustments)
- Bid for cleaning of the gym floor and strip and wax of the FLC kitchen floor submitted

As I mentioned, this list does not contain the usual maintenance of our HVAC systems and other routine maintenance things. We turned in a budget of \$15,000 for 2024, this covers all of the incidentals, cleaning supplies, paper products that we use on a daily basis.

I would like to thank the cemetery committee as well, they do a lot of things around the Church and grounds!

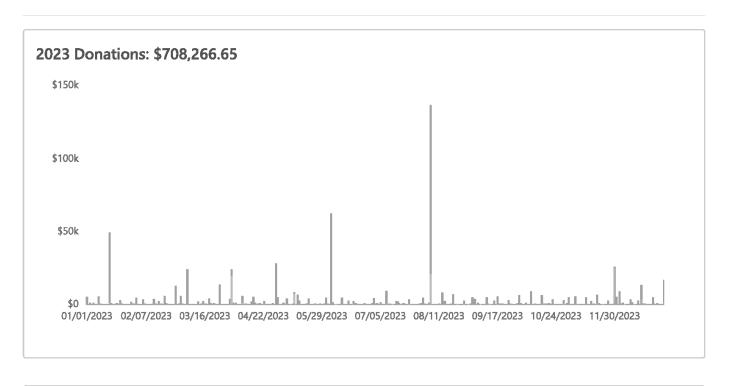

We are known as **TPSY--Tack**, **Pack**, **Snack and Yak**--but our purpose remains the same as we Share Christ's Love with All. Each Tuesday about 20 or more women gather to work at putting quilt tops and backs together, tying the quilts, rolling bandages from cotton sheets, sorting items for all of our kits (baby, health, sewing) and getting all these items packed and ready to ship. We also enjoy great fellowship and friendship during our coffee and snacks-coffee time starts about 10 a.m.--so you are welcome to join us during this time if you wish. We enjoy brunch followed by devotions and short business meeting including treasurer's report on second Tuesday of each month--short business meeting when needed.

Our monthly Bible Study is held 4th Wednesday of each month at 1:30 p.m. in HDR --ALL are welcome to join us as we use the suggested Bible Study in our GATHER magazine for discussion.

Some of our projects we helped with this year were providing bars/cookies for Proclamation on the Prairie held in January; working with our youth going to Colorado to furnish food and help serve two Lenten suppers;

helped serve farewell brunch for Pastor Adam Guthmiller; furnished and served desserts for Crooks Food Truck Friday in May; and replenished our supply of frozen meals for our Meal Ministry.

Committee was formed to start looking for remodel ideas for our Heritage Dining Room kitchen to hopefully be started in the next year.

Our group purchases and presents Bibles to ALL third graders each fall; also purchase school supplies and have our 5th graders assemble these into school kits--we thank them for helping pack 139 kits this fall which are shipped thru LWR (Lutheran World Relief) for distribution.

In October, we hosted a Crossroads Conference Leadership Event with the theme "Build a Longer Table--Just Love" for WELCA women. We heard and shared ideas of how we can encourage more interest and involvement by women in our church in this busy world with many good ideas for the ladies to take back to their respective churches. Officers were given information related to their particular office and informational packets provided. Crossroads Conference Board members thank those ladies who brought bars for morning coffee and helped serve the catered lunch.

Thankoffering Sunday we display some of the quilts we work on during the year, collect a Thankoffering for Churchwide use, and this year gave away another quilt in a free drawing with Jim Zeisler as our lucky winner.

We also have a few days during the year "away" from church--this year we visited the quarry in Sioux Falls (offered by Siouxland Heritage Museum) on a bus tour; visited McCrossan Boys Ranch; and enjoyed some Christmas caroling and history of the store on our visit to Nora Store near Alcester. Several ladies also returned to McCrossan to wrap Christmas gifts for those living at the ranch.

Our Synod's vision of Journeying Together in Christ has continued to focus our work. We invite you to take a few moments to review the list below which celebrates some of the ministry we shared together in 2023. **Journeying together in Christ as the South Dakota Synod, in 2023 we:**

- Applied for and received a grant of **\$1,137,384** from Lilly Endowment Inc. through its Thriving Congregations Initiative for new initiatives that are not included the Synod's Mission Plan. Please reach out to Synod Staff for **more information**!
- Completed explorations for two new potential church plants, with plans to start a worshiping community in **Box Elder** and **Shepherd's Table in Sioux Falls**.
- Walked with the 40 people in various stages of Candidacy and have 4 new entrance interviews scheduled in 2024!
- Received 3 new first call candidates.
- Completed 23 Ministry Site Studies and extended 28 calls!
- Ensured that nearly every congregation has a called pastor, interim pastor, Synod Authorized Minister, or lay leader to care for God's people (thank you to all of you who are helping out with area congregations and filling in!).
- Distributed **\$77,137** to date through the Seminary Debt Reduction Program.
- Granted **\$123,000** in scholarship funds to seminary students, **\$11,400** in internship site assistance, and **\$82,990** to Luther and Wartburg Seminaries, for a total of **\$217,390** in support of seminary education.
- Created a **pilot rural J-term** program with Wartburg Theological Seminary, which will begin in January 2024.
- Received **\$113,635** in grants from ELCA Christian Community & Leadership.
- Held a **Synod Assembly**, where we gathered again as a community to conduct the business of the synod.
- Hosted Spring and Fall Theological Conferences, where we continued to support the continuing education of our Rostered Ministers either online or in-person.
- Supported the congregations and ministries of the synod through **visits** by synod staff, both **digital** and in-person.
- Hosted a "Lay Leader Night" to support congregational lay leaders and supported rostered leaders with regular inperson and virtual meetings, such as monthly rostered minister virtual check-ins, Synodically Authorized Minister, Senior Pastor, and Interim Pastor check-ins, and a First Call and Senior Pastor Retreat.
- Pr. Alan Blankenfeld, Synod **Rural Ministry Liaison** continued to journey with our rural ministry sites. In the past year, Pr. Alan has worked directly with **34 communities and congregations in transition**.
- Continued the work of the Rural Ministry Table, which is currently working on **Small Town and Rural (STAR) grants**, grants funded by the generous donations to rural ministry in the Synod.
- Partnered with Bergen Lutheran to hold a Threshing Bee which resulted in gifts of \$51,324 to support rural ministry in South Dakota.

Thank you for all the ways you have supported the ministry of the South Dakota Synod this past year! God has called us to be the body of Christ together, and this is an active and healthy body. We look forward to continuing our journey with you in 2024 and beyond!

An Introduction to the Journeying Together in Christ Grant from Lilly Endowment

As we announced earlier this month, the South Dakota Synod of the Evangelical Lutheran Church in America (ELCA) has been awarded a grant of over \$1.1 million from Lilly Endowment Inc. through its Thriving Congregations Initiative.

The grant will be used by the Synod to live fully its vision of "Journeying Together in Christ," by relating to congregations with intentionality, equipping leaders for ministry, networking across the church, and advocating for shared leadership, especially among our rural congregations.

The Synod developed the work of this initiative in response to three critical questions posed by Bishop Constanze Hagmaier and her staff in 2019 at statewide "Listen, Learn and Care" events: "What gives you joy?" and "What keeps you up at night?" and "How will we journey together?" One person's poignant response resonated deeply: South Dakota ELCA churches are struggling with "fitting who we are into pews made for who we were."

This grant will be used in two focus areas. First, it will be used to engage both lay and rostered congregational leaders by leveraging digital technologies to create *Connect*, a Synod-wide community hub for learning, resources and conversation. Next, it will be used to engage congregations with innovative Rural Immersion Ministries which will create congregational learning experiences designed to recognize and bridge the rural/urban cultural divide.

These projects are being funded through Lilly Endowment's Thriving Congregations Initiative. The aim of the initiative is to encourage the flourishing of congregations by helping them deepen their relationships with God, enhance their connections with each other, and contribute to the vitality of their communities and the world.

The work of this grant award will be closely aligned with the Synod's existing and emerging resources, expertise, and experience. However, it is important to note that this grant is funding work outside of the 2024 Mission Plan approved by the 2023 Synod Assembly. Therefore, it is critical that congregations and organizations continue their mission support to the South Dakota Synod to ensure that the regular and essential work of the Synod continues.

If you would like to find out more about the work that the grant award will enable, there will be two virtual informational meetings on **Tuesday**, **January 9**, **2024** that will be open to all members of the South Dakota Synod to attend - one at **12:30pm CT** and one at **7:30pm CT**. Both sessions will include time for attendees to ask questions about the grant. More information on how to attend these meetings will be provided in the Synod's weekly e-newsletter and the Synod website (www.sdsynod.org).

"How Much Is Enough?"

That's a bold question to open an annual report to all of those congregations whose generous mission support is an essential reason that planned giving ministry recognized its 40th anniversary in the South Dakota Synod this year. We celebrated all of those who have been a part of Lutheran Planned Generosity and its predecessor organizations at the 2023 Synod Assembly, and issued a challenge to identify 40 gift plans to honor 40 years of generosity. It's not too late for you to be a part of the celebration--just contact us and let



us know that you have made a gift in your will or through a beneficiary designation, or would like to do so. For all of those who are a part of this history and continue to generously support ministry in the Synod and around the world, thank you! You are making a difference!

Back to that opening question. Relax and breathe a sigh of relief. We're not going to give you rules or scripture verses to calculate the expected size of your gifts. Rather, it's an invitation to each of us to better understand "How much is enough FOR ME?" In a world that tells us we should constantly strive for a bigger bank account, a larger home, a newer car, a longer vacation and the next promotion, it's easy to get lost and overwhelmed in the striving and never know when we've reached the point that we have enough. Because God entrusts us as stewards and caretakers, not owners, of all that we have, maybe an understanding of what that number is would be helpful for each of us. What if God continues to place more resources under our management to allow us to simplify our lives by supporting ministry and serving our neighbors instead of adding another zero to the balance sheet?

If you've never thought about your "enough" and how God might be calling you to make a difference through generosity, we're inviting you to the conversation. LPGSD is here to help you think about how your life can make a difference for your loved ones, your church, your community and all of those in need around the world.

It might be a gift in your will, or as a beneficiary designation from your IRA or investment account or life insurance policy. Or maybe using a tool that creates tax savings and income for you today AND a gift to ministry later.

In addition to this work with individuals and families, LPGSD also walks alongside congregations hoping to create or revitalize their own legacy through an endowment fund, offering members the opportunity to share in the ministry and outreach of their Christian family. Did you know that **more than \$650,000** was distributed to ministry from South Dakota endowment funds held at the ELCA Foundation in 2023? Your personal legacy plan might even include a family endowment or a gift to establish an endowment at your own congregation.

Thank you, to all of the individuals and congregations that supported the ministry of Lutherans Outdoors(LO) with financial gifts. Also, thank you to all of the individuals who attended summer camps, retreats, and travel experiences. LO cannot be the ministry that welcomes all to explore and experience Christ's love in community and creation without you!

REIMAGINING LUTHERANS OUTDOORS

The Board of Lutherans Outdoors emphasis in 2023 was the **REIMAGINING of** Lutherans Outdoors. Eight Task Forces have met, and continue to meet, diving into eight audits of the ministry. These eight areas are Philosophy, Finance, Financial Development, Marketing, Governance, Facility, Program, and Staffing. Results so far include the development of new Core Values where we promise to **EXPLORE FAITH**, **WELCOME ALL. BUILD LEADERS**, and **CARE FOR ALL CREATION**.

There are nearly 100 recommendations that have resulted from these eight audits. The recommendations will provide guidance for the Strategic process LO will develop for the next several years. The final results of the **REIMAGINING** will be presented to the Board of Directors at their January meeting, with a presentation to the voting members at the LO 2023 Annual Meeting in June 2024.

STAFF UPDATES

During 2023, Lutherans Outdoors said goodbye to Teri Gayer, who served many roles with LO during the past 30-plus years, most recently as the Director of Klein Ranch. During the celebration of 50 years of ministry at Klein Ranch last July, Teri was recognized for her ministry.

In May, LO said hello to Skylar Schwab, who assumed the Program Director position at Outlaw Ranch. Klaire Hudson resigned earlier in the spring from this position after serving in this role. Skylar jumped right into a busy summer and we are very excited she has joined the LO family!

Our summer camper attendance increased by 15% as a whole in 2023. Outlaw Ranch saw a 22% increase boosted by nearly 100 more Family Campers. Klein Ranch saw a 19% increase. NeSoDak saw a 4% decrease in campers. The total camper number was nearly 1,350.

Our Adult Travel Experiences had over 60 participants to our two destinations: Holden Village and Branson. In 2024, Experiences will be to Minneapolis for a theatre event in April, to the Upper Peninsula of Michigan in September, to the Smokie Mountains and Dollywood in October, and a return to Branson in November.

The new Horse Corral at Outlaw Ranch was completed in 2023. This great addition provides a wonderful place to care for the horses and a safe place for campers to begin their horse care education and rides each week.

Greetings from your camp - Shetek Lutheran Ministries!

This summer we served 770 total campers, which includes our youth campers, cross-generational campers and our SOS campers. We are close to serving as many campers as before the pandemic. 2023 was a 24% increase in camper numbers over 2022 and about 94% of the campers we had in 2019. One of our greatest challenges continues to be finding young adults who are willing to serve for the summer. Our summer ministry team of 20 young adults served faithfully this summer and grew in their faith and in their leadership skills. We were blessed with 7 international counselors this past summer from the United Kingdom, Jamaica, Zambia, Mexico, Zimbabwe and two from South Africa. Shetek will be inviting several international counselors in 2024 also.

Our "Building on the Foundation" capital campaign continues with primarily the congregational phase. Several congregations have run successful campaigns in their congregations so far. We will be contacting all our 100 member congregations to give them the opportunity to participate. We continue to visit with prospective major donors, those who give or pledge \$5,000 or more for the campaign. We have met our phase 1 goal of \$1,500,000 and our total so far in cash and pledges is about \$1,613,000 as we work towards our challenge goal of \$2,000,000. The new lodge is done and is being used by a variety of different groups from scrapbooking groups, Scout groups, family gatherings and college students. The Property Committee and Board are working on plans for the first new cabin and we hope to begin construction in the spring.

Some improvements in 2023 – we upgraded the sound system in the chapel, replaced the reverse osmosis system in the Dining Hall, had to replace the motor on the pontoon, repaired the east wall of the chapel and painted it, painted 3 cabins along with the office, and removed several trees.

I am thankful for our year round staff who continue to work as a team to serve our guests and campers and provide great hospitality. Shetek welcomed Gaelyn Gernentz in March to our Housekeeping team, Deb Ness in June to our Summer Food Service, Joe Koenigs in June to our Maintenance team, and Alexandra Cowell began in September on our Housekeeping team.

We are so grateful for the many campers and guests that came this year. Shetek has impacted so many lives over the years. One of our Counselors in Training (CIT) had this to say about last summer.

"I feel closest to God when I am at camp. I consider camp to be my second home during the summer. This summer, I felt called and was able to have the opportunity to spend about 6 weeks volunteering at camp and I learned a lot. I learned how to respond to stressful situations better, I was able to make, renew, and grow friendships, and I strengthened my leadership skills by helping lead activities like games, worship, reading scripture, and more. I feel that I grow in my faith on a deeper level and grow closer to God everyday there."

Shetek continues to receive estate gifts periodically, which we are very thankful for. Over the years, these thoughtful gifts have really benefitted the ministry at Shetek. Footnote to Balance Sheet

Not included in this balance sheet is an endowment fund established with the Sioux Falls Area Community Foundation entitled **UTHE FAMILY PIONEER ASSOCIATION ENDOWMENT**.

This fund was established in 2005 for the benefit of Pioneer Cemetery. The funds in this account have been excluded from the balance sheet as the "ownership" of this account belongs to the Sioux Falls Area Foundation. Annually, on a fiscal year ending June 30, the Foundation determines what amount from this fund is available for distribution to the cemetery. I have included the **Available Spendable Balance** as other asset on the balance sheet entitled "Uthe Endowment Funds — Available Funds".

During the year 2023 Doug & Carol Uthe contributed an addition \$ 62,000.00 in corpus.

The balance as of December 31, 2023 in The Uthe Family Pioneer Association Endowment equals \$97,912.74.

All With Your Partnership in **Healing Outreach**

Runaway & Homeless Youth have brighter futures. 93% returned to their family or transitioned to a safe living environment and 100% enrolled in school or a GED program at discharge.

Children & teens are healing from trauma. 89% of youth in Foster Care and 91% of youth in Residential Treatment showed reduced trauma symptoms over the course of their time with LSS.

Mentors are making a difference. 97% of high school mentees are on track to graduate with their class in May and 92% indicate they have improved self-esteem.

Families are safer.

65% of individuals in family violence intervention demonstrate a reduction in criminal thinking. This is a staggering increase of 29% from when the program was transitioned to LSS.

LSS Strategic Plan In Action

This year marked the first year of our new strategic plan in action. Our board of directors, executive team and leadership developed a four-year strategic plan and line of sight that guides our work toward making the greatest contribution to accomplishing our vision that all people in South Dakota will be healthy, safe and accepted.

Our operational strategies prioritize workforce & inclusivity within our organization and communities, financial viability of the agency and our services, and sharing the positive impact our work makes in the community through storytelling.

Expanded Mentoring Services to serve youth in more communities throughout the state

Strengthened efforts to prioritize family role in an individual's success by elevating youth & family voice

Implemented Strengthening Families, a curriculum that helps build strong communication between parents and their children and helps families navigate conflict

Resettled 197 refugees through traditional resettlement and 290 Ukrainian refugees through Uniting for Ukraine pathways. We are expecting an additional 400 traditional and 50 U4U.
